The old Orange County Courthouse is a two-story, temple-form structure built of brick laid in Flemish bond with the bays separated by flat pilaster strips.

The north (front) facade features a well-proportioned Doric tetrastyle pedimented portico. The large columns support a full entablature which carries around the building. The tympanum is unadorned. Beneath the portico is a central entrance containing a double door. It is surmounted by a fanlight set in a semicircular brick arch with a granite keystone. On the second floor level there are three large windows.

The east and west sides are five bays long with interior chimneys rising from the south corners and between the second and third bays on either side.

The south facade is also pedimented. In the typanum is an oval oculus containing a vent pierced with an unusual geometric design.

All windows have twelve-over-twelve sash and feature flat arches with granite keystones and sills.

Above the north portico is a clock tower which rises in two distinct stages. The first section, square in plan, with a clock face on each side, is of wood fashioned to resemble rusticated stone. The upper section is octagonal and features a narrow window on each face separated by stylized pilasters which support a bold entablature. The tower is topped by a semispherical dome.

On the first floor is an entrance hall across the front with a stair at either end, which rise to a common landing above the main entrance and ascend in a single transverse flight to the second floor. The landing is supported by a pair of chamfered posts on square pedestals. A central hall runs from the stair hall straight through the building with rooms on either side. There is a fireplace in each room on the right of the hall and in the south room on the left. The mantels are all of the same basic design, consisting of simple molded shelves resting on heavy Doric pilasters. All rooms feature simple Classic Revival trim with the heavy moldings of the door and window cases adorned with corner blocks.

The second floor consists of a large courtroom with the jury room and judge's chamber on either side of the stair at the north end. To the right of the entrance to the courtroom is a narrow stair which ascends in several flights to the clock tower. Most of the original interiors were replaced during a late nineteenth century renovation. The courtroom, however, retains many of its original forensic appointments. Since 1957 it has served as a museum.

The Orange County Historical Museum contains exhibits illustrating the first hundred years of Orange County history. Three recent murals on the north wall by Kenneth Whitsett depict significant events in Hillsborough from 1752 to 1788.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The old Orange County Courthouse was built in 1845 on public lot number 1, the site of several earlier governmental structures in Hillsborough. It was constructed by Captain John Berry, a native of the town. A prominent local politician and builder of the period, Berry also constructed other buildings in Hillsborough, including the Methodist Church. He remodeled the Burwell School building and built Eagle Lodge, No. 19, A. F. & A. M., which was designed by William Nichols, state architect. Elsewhere he constructed Smith Hall (Playmaker's Theatre) from the designs of A. J. Davis on the campus of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and built Wait Hall (destroyed), the first building at Wake Forest College.

Berry's courthouse served as the seat of Orange County's government until 1954 when a new building was completed. The old corthouse now contains the offices of the Orange County Board of Education and the Orange County Historical Museum.

The architectural importance of the old Orange County Courthouse is clear. Thomas Waterman called it "a singularly felicitous example of American Classic Revival architecture," while Talbot Hamlin deemed it "one of the best of its type anywhere in the country. Its four-column, widely spaced Greek Doric portico, its unusually forceful and well-designed cupola, and its quiet brick walls are almost perfect of their kind."
